# JAIL DECONGESTION PROGRAM

*The program strengthened the access to justice of detainees through jail decongestion, capacity building, coordination, and knowledge sharing by promoting the detainees' right to liberty, health, and reformation. It has also established programs in legal aid clinics and enhanced the abilities of law students to conduct and facilitate the program's activities.*



The Jail Decongestion (JD) program provided successful interventions to its released persons deprived of liberty (PDLs) by direct and indirect assistance through case follow-ups, consultations, and paralegal and human rights trainings.

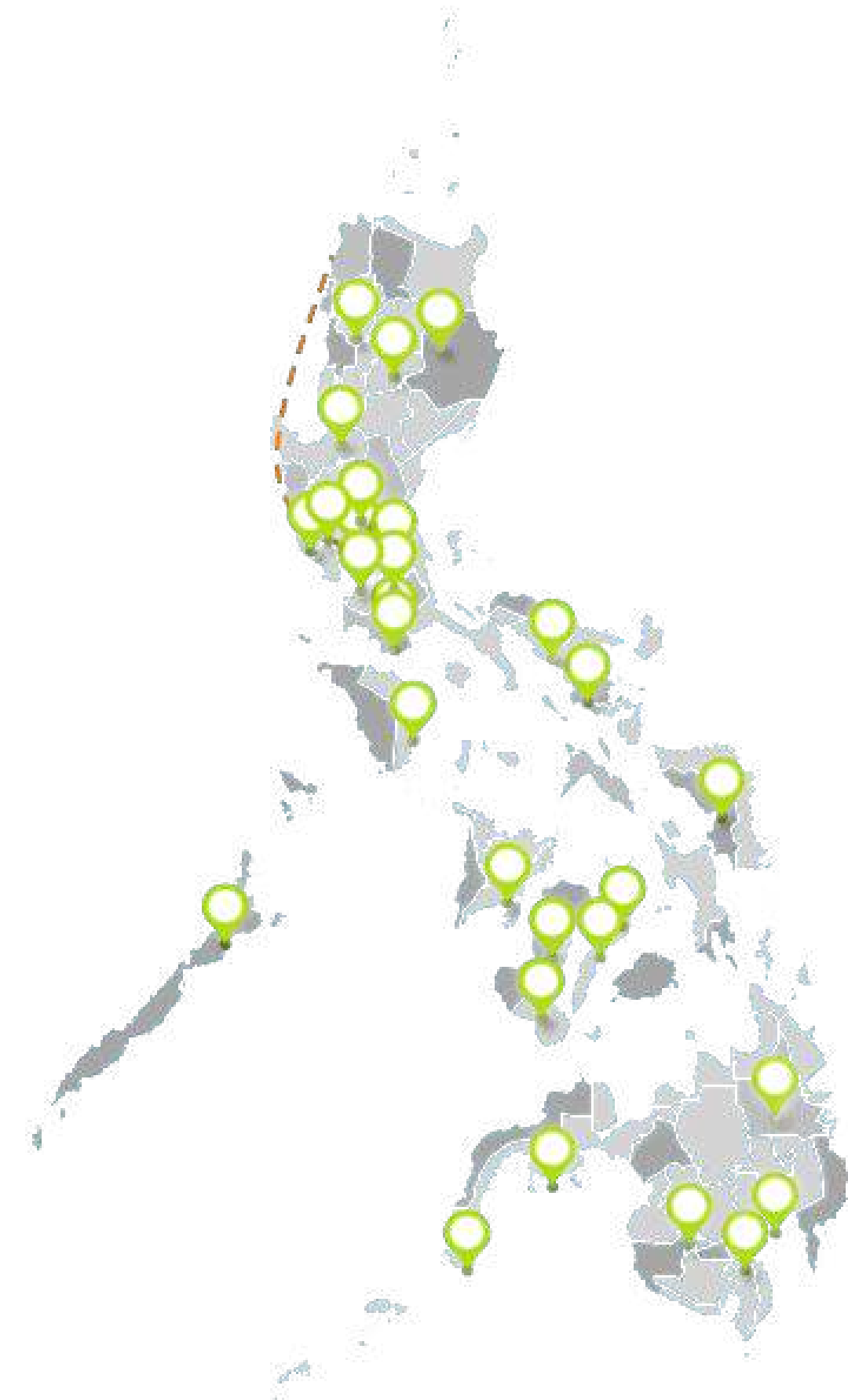
The program's case consultations to PDLs provided speedy, efficient, and successful case interventions.

The program also provided welfare missions which addressed the psychosocial needs and physical well-being of the inmates, and the corresponding dynamics in prison settings, as well as social care and assistance including early detection of mental health concerns.

PDLs, duty-bearers, and community volunteers were capacitated to exercise their rights by raising awareness and empowering them with important laws through paralegal trainings.

The program has empowered legal aid clinics as host organizations in regional areas and cities willing to convene Task Force Katarungan at Kalayaan (TFKK) activities.

HLAF's good relationships with partner jails and extending good will through initiatives has created opportunities to donate equipment and supplies from different local and international partners and stakeholders.

# CENTER FOR RESTORATIVE ACTION PROGRAM

*The program provided LGU's, law enforcement officers, social workers, legal practitioners, children's rights workers, volunteers and other stakeholders with strengthened, innovative, and leading methodologies in handling Children at Risk (CAR) and Children in Conflict with the Law (CICL) cases.*



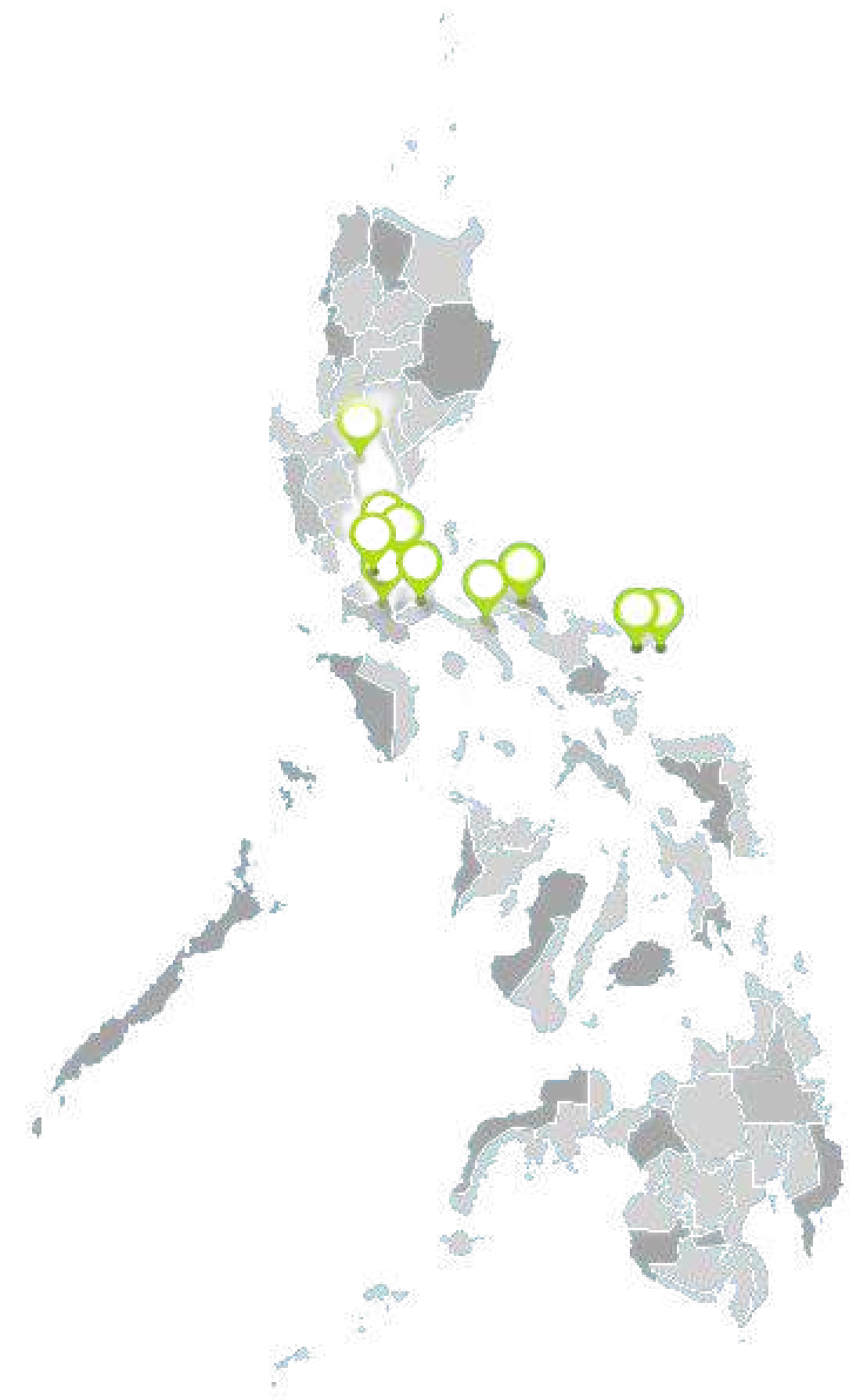
The Center for Restorative Action (CRA) program conducted Learning Sessions that increased knowledge on Human Rights, Juvenile Justice, Restorative Justice, and on Mainstreaming Children's issues.

Direct mentoring sessions were also provided by the team to assist stakeholders to properly handle cases of children in conflict with the law and children at risk. The beneficiaries mentored have accumulated significant credibility and trust among the communities that they work with that they become a significant influential force for communities to act for the benefit of the children.

The program also made local duty bearers, students, and community members realize the proper implementation of existing laws through advocacy campaigns and social engagements.

Among the crowning successes of the CRA program is that they were a significant influence to move to enshrine these ideals in key local legislations.

The CRA program has been effective to help local government units learn concepts of restorative and juvenile justice but also the legal framework in which they can legally implement provisions. As a result, many CARs and CICLs have been prevented from getting into contact with the criminal justice system which would have further made it difficult to change.

# FOCUSED REINTEGRATION OF EX-DETAINEEES PROGRAM

*The program addressed the lack of reintegration programs for newly released inmates in the country. Its aim is to help heal the lives of inmates in need of a second chance and help them explore opportunities to become valuable and contributing members of society. The goal of the program is reintegrated inmates to their communities and create a safe space to reduce the stigma against inmates.*

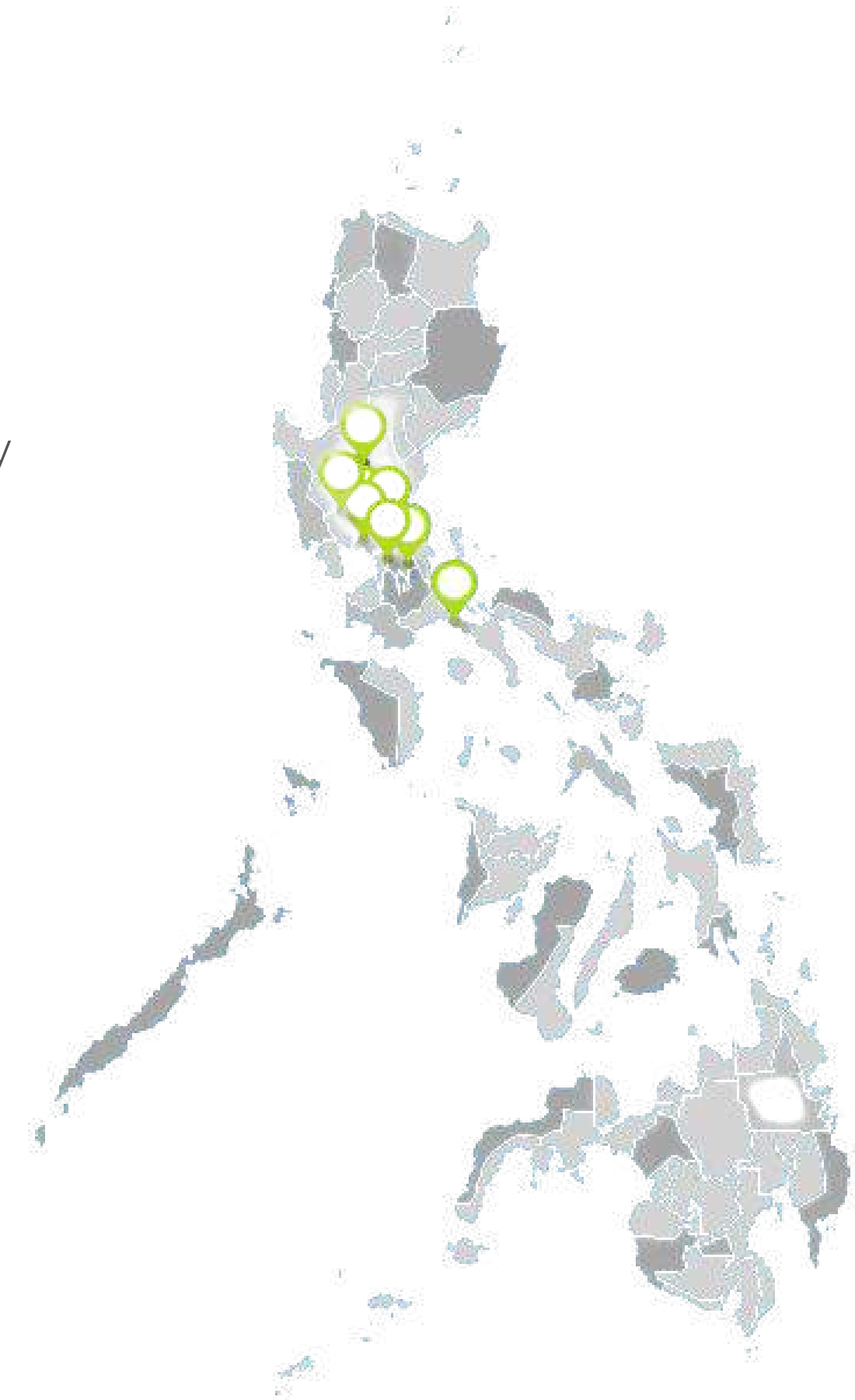


The Focused Reintegration of Ex-Detainees (FRED) program continued to take steps toward coordinating with local government units to help them realize the opportunities for former PDLs to contribute to their families and communities. Despite their past, HLAF recognizes the PDL's potential for change and their desire to pursue productive employment for their benefit as well as for those they care about.

The reintegration and formation sessions for ex-detainees have prepared them with debriefing activities, values formation, and life-skill trainings.

The advocacy partnerships held meetings between schools, local government agencies, non-government organizations, and private individuals to discuss activities that may promote the welfare and well-being of ex-detainees.

The FRED team is also becoming well-known as experts on PDL aftercare and mental health. The Commission on Human Rights (CHR), Caritas, and the Department of Social Welfare and Development consulted the FRED team regarding their expertise with PDL care and reintegration of former PDLs.

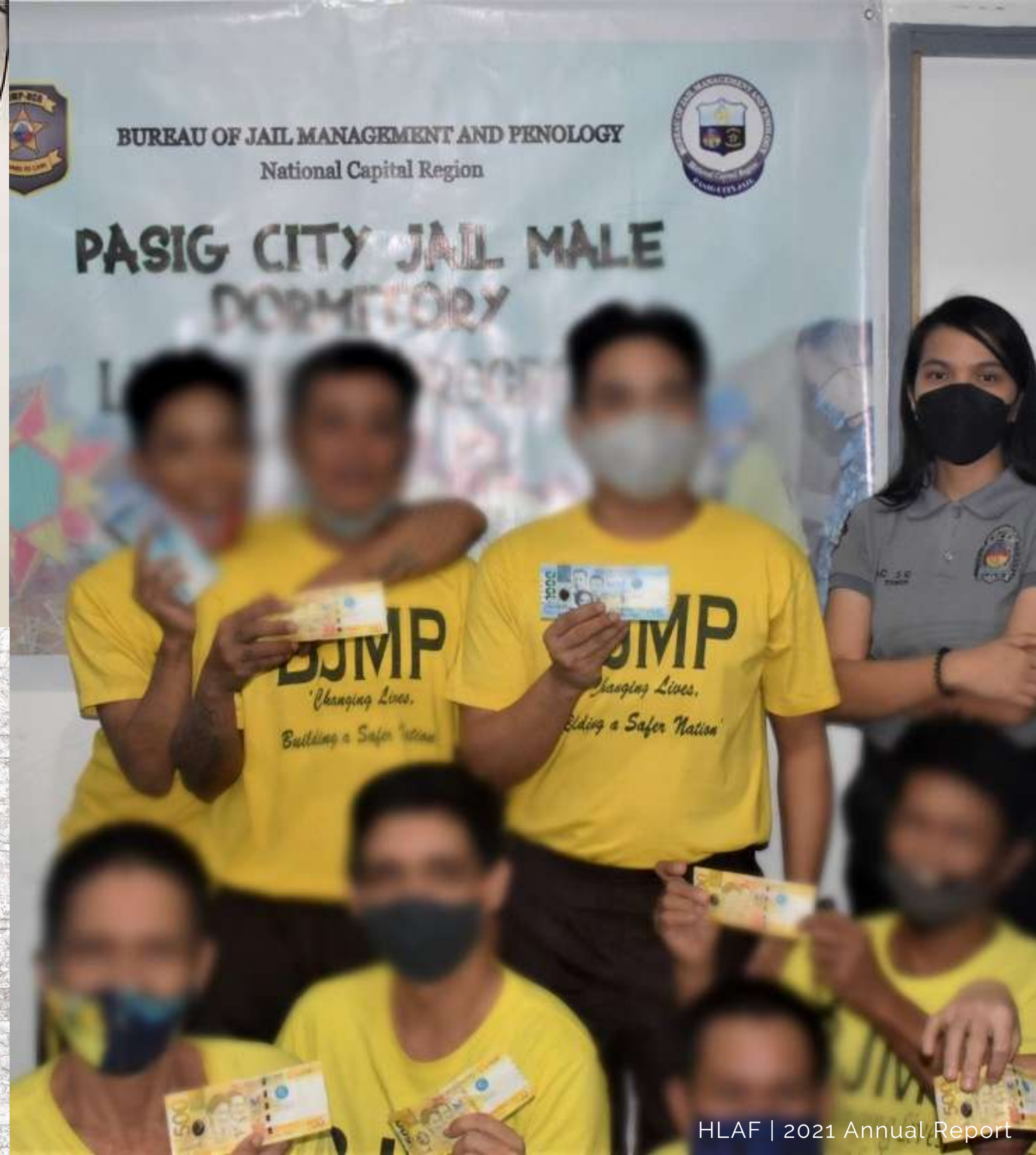
